<p>Public discussion ‘Collapse is not apocalypse’, 12 November 2022, Barcelona, Spain</p> <p>ODG organised a series of talks and sessions in connection with a reading group of the book ‘Collapse. Terminal capitalism, ecosocial transition and ecofascism’ by Carlos Taibo. In a context of intersecting crises in which transitions based on the energy, technology and digital and transport sectors are mostly being unfolded by institutions and corporations, the aim of the discussions was to address the different dimensions of collapse, from the analysis of the concept, to coping strategies and technical evidence, to a more emotional part of how we deal with its consequences. The specific aim of the talk was to open a dialogue to address the current evidence of the collapse we are already experiencing and the paths towards a just transition in a sufficiency scenario.</p> <p>The participants expressed that the reading group was useful to carry out an exercise of collective reflection, listening and debate on desirable proposals in a context of intersecting crises. The event provided a good opportunity for members of the reading group to meet the author of the book ‘Collapse. Terminal capitalism, ecosocial transition and ecofascism’ and discuss its main arguments.</p> <p>A total amount of 134 people participated in the event (77 male, 44 female and 13 people who didn't want to indicate their gender). The participants were mostly from the Catalonia region in Spain but also from other non-EU countries (who are not reported for this deliverable). The event was promoted on Twitter.</p>			

The session took place on a day of international climate mobilisation and ended with a joint action uniting different entities and civil society activists.

The talk was [recorded](#) and uploaded to Youtube, where it has accumulated 2419 views since November.

Seminar ‘Debt: Old wine in a new bottle: Let’s organize against a new wave of green-tinged austerity’, 10 June 2023, Barcelona, Spain

On 10 June, the Debt Observatory in Globalization held a meeting between international networks and activists from different fields to discuss the relationship between debt and the current moment, the different struggles and how it is present in our daily lives.

Specifically, the following issues were discussed: the global debt situation and how the new recovery funds set up after the pandemic could possibly generate a new austerity scenario; the relationship between climate emergency and the process of indebtedness; the main consequences of the European green and digital transition and recovery; debt in everyday life and gender and colonial debts; and how debt can be related to the struggles for the climate and for the defence of life and territories.

The audience showed interest in the subject matter and specifically on the links between global debt and everyday debt. At the end of each session there was the possibility of dialogue between the participants (who were active in asking questions and making comments) and the panelists.

Simultaneous interpretation into Spanish and English was provided. The interpreters did a good job. Despite being subject-specific, they provided detailed and faithful translations for the different speakers.

A total amount of 69 people participated in the event (23 were, 43 female, 1 non-binary and 2 people that didn’t want to answer about their gender). The participants were mostly from Spain but also from Germany, Belgium, France, the Netherlands. There were also participants from outside the EU from Chile, Peru, Puerto Rico and Tunis.
